Consumer Economics Impacts through Tennessee FCS Extension Programs

We are appreciative of our work in communities with TAFCS members across the state. In many counties TAFCS members partner to implement Extension consumer economics programs. Through this work agents and volunteer leaders have focused programming on (1) training citizens in sound basic financial practices, (2) encouraging Tennesseans to save to build assets over their working lives, and (3) encouraging individuals and households to reduce dependence on credit and decrease debt.

Family and Consumer Sciences (FCS) Extension financial education activities are conducted through bankruptcy education, homebuyer education, High School Financial Planning and teacher training, saving education for adults and youth, and financial education simulations for youth. Counties across Tennessee reported 136,880 total direct educational contacts by agents and volunteers through group meetings, programs, and other direct methods. An additional 1,172,392 Tennesseans were reached with the message of the importance of savings and financial responsibility through agent and volunteer media and exhibits. Agents logged a total of 18,112 hours in financial education programming with 4,953 additional hours logged by volunteers.

Our Impacts: The percentage of Extension clientele reporting saving fell to 56.0 after rising consistently over the prior three years (36.9 percent in 2014; 58.9 in 2015; and 62.3 in 2016). Per-month savings and debt reduction amounts continued to trend down. The estimated economic impact of clienteles' saving totaled \$1,483,812 in 2017, with debt reduction estimates totaling \$1,329,876. The total estimated impact of Extension Tennessee Saves adult and youth programs as well as youth financial simulations on Tennesseans' saving increase and debt reduction was \$2,813,688. Six hundred thirteen prospective homeowners successfully completed homebuyer education requirements. Sixteen hundred twenty eight bankruptcy filers completed financial education courses to prepare for exiting bankruptcy. Thirteen completed pre-filing bankruptcy counseling. Dr. Ann Berry aberry9@utk.edu and Dr. Dena Wise dkwise@utk.edu are the University of Tennessee Extension Faculty who provide leadership for the Extension Consumer Economics programs across the state.

Thank you for your involvement in local efforts such as On My Own Financial Simulation, Health Insurance Literacy, and other financial education programs. Through our work we are helping individuals and families become more financially secure and build important financial management skills.
